Hurricane Season Starts June 1; Prepare Now

June 1 marked the beginning of the hurricane season and right on cue two tropical systems flared up near Florida. The one we kept our eyes on was borne from a hurricane that made landfall in Mexico and then moved across the gulf to South Florida. Some areas of Southwest Florida received up to 11 inches of rain, but we were spared the worst of it. A second disturbance moved off the east coast with minimal development.

This time of year, tropical weather, plus severe thunderstorms capable of producing hail, damaging winds and even tornadoes, should always be on the top of our minds. Residents should have an emergency plan in place and police their property for material (vegetative debris, lawn furniture, gardening tools, etc.) that could be wind-borne hazards.

Please be aware fertilizers containing nitrogen or phosphorous may not be used on residential or commercial turf or landscape plants in Charlotte County between June 1 and Sept. 30.

During the summer rainy season, unnecessary fertilizing and improper fertilizer application can result in runoff that sends nutrients into waterways where they feed harmful aquatic algae.

Charlotte County Water Quality Manager Brandon Moody said in an interview with WGCU radio that the algal growth enabled by excessive nutrients "can cause a reduction in oxygen in the water that can make it difficult for fish and other organisms that need oxygen to survive. It can block out sunlight, which seagrass needs to be able to grow and thrive. So, it's important for us to do our part to maintain the balance, which is really what it's all about in ecosystems like Charlotte Harbor. It's about balance."

People often think complex environmental issues are beyond their control. This is one way everyone can play a role in reducing nutrient runoff.

CHARLOTTE COUNTY Facilities Construction & Maintenance



New Fire Station 5 is located on 15200 Burnt Store Rd, Punta Gorda, replacing the old fire station located on 26287 Notre Dame Blvd. The 9,232 sf building will be ready for move-in within several weeks. The apparatus bay section accommodates four emergency response vehicles. The station has separate bunk gear storage, kitchen space with all the latest amenities, laundry room, radio control room, workout room, sleeping quarters, restroom/shower facilities, and a day room. The structure was constructed with impact windows and emergency generator power.

This new fire station will be able to house more fire staff and equipment to better serve the public as our community grows. Wilder Architecture, Inc. designed the building and Wharton-Smith, Inc. completed the construction under the construction manager delivery method. Reconfiguration of the Eastport Utilities Customer Service area was completed to support the reopening to the public.




- The Facilities team recently stocked supplies preparing for hurricane season. We ran our generators and chainsaws and fueled vehicles.
- DMK Associates Inc. signed an agreement to conduct an evaluation for Live Oak Point Boardwalk Renovations to propose design and construction methods for repairs to the boardwalk damaged by a storm on 12/21/2021.
- The Lake Betty Restroom project is in the design development phase, consisting of detailed discussions of building systems and components. Drawings and specifications were submitted for stakeholder review, while cost estimates are being prepared.
- Lighting District Campus upgrades at


the Tech Shop include installing metal roof and gutters, new windows, new

New Facilities Soon

In the May 2021 report, we were talking about new projects and stations in the works. In this report, we will give an update

and share some pictures of a few projects. In April, we held a ribbon-cutting event for our new Station 10 on Don Pedro Island. We are happy to report that the crew is enjoying their new home.



Our new Aircraft Rescue and

Fire Fighting (ARFF) simulator is nearing completion. The airplane prop sitting next to our training tower is easy to spot and has expectedly drawn a lot of interest. Once operational, Charlotte County can boast to have the most advanced ARFF simulator in the country. While we hope to have it completed



and turned over to us by mid-July, we are planning to host a grand opening and ribbon-cutting in October.

Two other replacement stations, Station 5 on Burnt Store Road and Station 2 on Collinswood are nearing completion. Station 5 will allow us to provide better service to the residents moving into the southern part of our county along Burnt Store Road. When Station 2 is completed, we have future room to expand to keep up with the



growth in the West Port neighborhood between US 41 and El Jobean Roads.



In the Works

Our Lighting District recently repaired a signal cabinet to be able to go back into service. A refurbished UPS Battery Back Up unit was installed at the intersection at Olympia & US 41 Southbound. This unit was removed from a recent project and repurposed to the City of Punta Gorda, making the intersection safer during storms and

during storms and power outages.



Did You Know?

Markham Waterway Bridge Rehabilitation is ongoing. This project is located on Chamberlain



Blvd. over the Markham Waterway, between McDill Dr. & Ramblewood St. in Northwest Port Charlotte. This project will include necessary bridge repairs as noted in the FDOT Bridge Inspection Report, which includes updating the bridge to current design codes, bat exclusion, and Charlotte County utility relocation.



Hurricane Preparedness: Utilities

UNDER CONSTRUCTION

- SR 776 Sewer Force Main Project: Upsizing the existing sewer force main to 12-inch and 16-inch lines along SR 776 from Biscavne Drive to the Charlotte Sports Park. This is an in-kind project for the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) Consent Order. Acquisition of materials delayed the start of the project. Construction is expected to begin this month.
- Ackerman Septic to Sewer Project: Construction of a wastewater system to service approximately 2,135 properties with sewer service. Zones 1, 2 and the vacuum station are currently underway. Crews are working on the water main replacement throughout the project area. Zone 1 sewer connections are expected to begin this fall.

- Deep Creek Sewer Force Main Project: Construction of a larger sewer force main to improve transmission capacity for the Deep Creek neighborhood. Crews are working on Phase 2 of the project. Work is occurring along Rio De Janéiro Ave. heading north towards Deep Creek Blvd. Project Map
- Sewer Lift Station Generator Project: Installation of stationary and mobile generators at our major sewer lift stations throughout the county. This project will allow lift stations to continue operations during storms and events when power is lost. All stationary generators are being installed at the 500-year flood elevation.
